

Texas Gov. Appoints Dr. Alan Tyroch to Trauma Advisory Council

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott recently designated Alan Tyroch, M.D., as chair of the Governor's Emergency Medical Services and Trauma Advisory Council (GETAC).

Dr. Tyroch, professor and founding chair of surgery at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso, has served on the advisory council since 2012. He was reappointed to the council by Gov. Abbott in 2018 and served as the council's vice chair since 2019. Dr. Tyroch's appointment as chair took effect on July 30 and he serves at the leisure of the governor. Dr. Tyroch is also chief of surgery and trauma medical director at University Medical Center of El Paso. He is board certified in general surgery and surgical critical care.

The advisory council makes recommendations to the Texas Department of Health and Human services regarding the EMS/trauma system in order to ensure that the community receives comprehensive and efficient emergency care. The advisory council plays a critical role in helping to make sure the Texas EMS/trauma system is prepared for potential mass casualty incidents including natural disasters and shootings like the August 3, 2019 mass shooting that killed 23 and wounded 24 in El Paso.

Dr. Tyroch said the COVID-19 outbreak throughout the state has presented challenges that could affect health care systems, but he remains hopeful that his appointment as chair of GETAC will provide a voice for the Borderland.

"The pandemic has impacted the state economically, and I just hope it doesn't impact the EMS and trauma health care system too much financially," Dr. Tyroch said. Having an El Paso physician on the advisory council is meaningful because of the city's location, which is far from other metropolitan areas of Texas. "First of all, we're not a small city. We're the sixth largest city in Texas," Dr. Tyroch said. "That's a pretty good size, but we're so far away from Austin – we're closer to cities in California than we are to Austin. It's important to have a voice to represent the El Paso region."

Dr. Tyroch is a member of the American College of Surgeons, Texas Surgical Society, American Association for the Surgery of Trauma, Society of Critical Care Medicine, Southwestern Surgical Congress, Western Surgical Association, American Trauma Society, Pediatric Trauma Society, Texas Medical Association, and El Paso County Medical Society. He received an Associate's in Applied Sciences from Temple College, a Bachelor of Science in Microbiology from Texas A&M University, and a Doctor of Medicine from The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston. He completed a general surgery internship at Baylor College of Medicine, a general surgery residency at Phoenix Integrated Surgical Residency Program, and a Trauma and Surgical Critical Care Fellowship at the University of California of San Francisco, Fresno campus. 

Henry Delgado, UMC Patient and COVID-19 Survivor Shares His Appreciation of UMC's Care

My name is Henry Delgado and I was a patient at UMC from 18 July 2020 -29 July 2020 in both your Covid ward and in your Covid ICU ward.

I still don't have the proper words to convey to you just how much I truly appreciate everything that your staff at UMC did for me during my illness and recovery of Covid-19. I tried to write down the names of the people that were instrumental in my treatment and recovery and I know that I missed some names and for that I deeply apologize.



Doctor Figueroa and his staff were absolutely amazing in my treatment while I was in the Covid-19 ICU ward. While I was there, I was taken care of by nurses Javier, Chris, Troy, Jessica, Jackie, Monica, Delilah, David and Janet. These people made me feel extremely comfortable with my treatment and they thoroughly explained all the procedures that were done to me and truly listened to all my concerns and made sure they addressed and answered all of my questions.

The Physical Therapists and Occupational Therapist Dane, Dana and Edgar were also extremely professional and treated me with the highest level of respect while they provided therapy and helped get me on my feet and doing exercises in the confined space of the ICU. From there, I was transferred back to the regular Covid ward where I was taken care of by Melissa, Donna, Jessica and Luis. Once again, they demonstrated the highest levels of professionalism in taking care of me and explaining everything to me that was taking place during the last stages of my treatment.

I would also like to thank all of the Respiratory Therapists that took care of me during my stay. I am sorry that I did not write any of their names down even though while they were treating me they did

tell me who they were, what their goals were for me under their care and how I was doing as far as meeting those goals they set for me. I was truly amazed once I got to know them, at the level of responsibility and autonomy that they have in treating patients. Again I deeply apologize for not naming these individuals and to those that I may have omitted by accident as I am not able to thank them individually.

The last bit of individual thanks I have are reserved for Doctor Marioni. My god what a gem of a person you have in him. Doctor Marioni talked to me and not at me when he came to visit me. He truly possesses the gift of empathetic listening. He allowed me to express my fears, feelings, and concerns and addressed everything with me in a way that put me very much at ease. I never felt rushed when I was speaking to him. The day that he came in to tell me he was releasing me from the hospital, Doctor Marioni took a knee on the floor besides my chair, put his hand on my shoulder and prayed with me.

What a powerful moment that was! He gave thanks to god for the gift of healing that I received and for allowing me to truly appreciate the gift of life and the desire to pay it forward and help others who are also affected with this disease.

I hope that by this letter, you can understand just a tiny bit of my appreciation that I have for your entire organization and rest assured that if I have a choice in the matter, I will never go anyplace else other than UMC if in the future I should require hospitalization for my medical needs. My grandfather, unfortunately, was admitted for a stroke last week to UMC. He did not survive. I just want to send my deepest appreciation and thanks to the staff for their extreme and speedy care for him.

He received treatment immediately upon his arrival. Staff allowed my grandmother, my mom and aunts to see him in the middle of the night in the ER before his transfer to ICU. Our entire family was also allowed to offer our good-byes, by two, inside the ICU. I know most hospitals have the strictest policies for visitors due to COVID. Many families aren't offered the opportunity to see family members in grave

condition. What you allowed for us is something that can never be replaced and on behalf of my family and myself, we just want to offer our most gracious gratitude for the high level of care provided, along with the compassionate understanding to say good-bye.
