UMC Opens Antibody Testing To All Associates

University Medical Center of El Paso this past week provided all Associates the opportunity to register and be tested for antibodies that are correlated with COVID-19. As the world has seen since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the importance of testing is of the utmost priority.



Time slots for the antibody

testing were completely filled for the first week with over a hundred Associates being tested in the first day. "The ability to know who had the virus and who doesn't provides critical information for our hospital and the region of El Paso," Miguel Rivera, from Infection Control says.

So What Does Antibody Testing Mean?

An antibody test can reveal whether a person might have developed immunity to COVID-19. Researchers haven't determined yet whether a person who has had and recovered from COVID-19 is protected from getting it again but from prior and preliminary studies, this shows like it might be the case. "It is important to see whether our healthcare workers have developed immunity," added Rivera. "Although our Associates would still be required to wear personal protective equipment (PPE), they would be at lower risk for getting re-infected, compared to those who do not have this immunity."

"A 'time -out' is utilized by a surgical team prior to the start of a procedure to help prevent wrongsite, wrong-side, wrong-procedure or wrong-person surgery," said Viola Cedillo, Assistant Administrator for Invasive Services. "Our staff is the best in the region and our hospital maintains a safe environment for all visiting
