UMC SUCCESSFULLY INTRODUCES THE OCTARAY

An advanced heart-mapping catheter to treat AFib

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) notched another first in the El Paso region with the successful introduction and use of the Octaray, an advanced heartmapping catheter to treat AFib.

AFib (atrial fibrillation) is when the heart beats too slowly, too fast, or in an irregular way. AFib is a major factor in certain cases of cardiac arrest, stroke and a general spiral of debilitating and life-threatening conditions.

The Octaray is a new catheter that allows surgeons to collect 40 percent more data. It also increases the speed, efficiency and accuracy of procedures, which means less anesthesia and faster recovery.

At UMC, surgeons are able to generate a 3D image of the heart, colorized in different colors, based on the timing of beat activity in various areas of the heart. The heart, while beating, appears on an advanced monitor above the patient, in front of the surgeon. The surgeon watches the live image built with data from the Octaray, and then uses the

electrodes to adjust the rhythm of the heart, successfully ridding the patient of AFib.

UMC's surgeons are able to insert the tool, typically through a vein in the inner thigh, and thread it up through the torso until it reaches the heart.

The Octaray was approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration in March 2022 and UMC is again first to utilize the latest in health technology to benefit El Pasoans.



A COLLABORATION WITH HIGH DESERT ORAL & FACIAL SURGERY

New UMC partnership brings El Pasoans greater access to advanced care

University Medical Center of El Paso has become a formal partner with the west El Paso location of High Desert Oral & Facial Surgery (HDOFS), providing more Borderland residents access to a full scope of oral and maxillofacial surgeries.

The hybrid clinic, located at 1770 Cimarron Rialto Pl. in northwest El Paso, features a hospital setting within a dental clinic. Patients will have access to procedures for cleft and craniofacial deformities, facial trauma, and dental implants.

The clinic is staffed by world recognized surgeons whose work has brought patients from all over the world to El Paso. Additionally, the newly renovated clinic offers state-of-the-art technology to help our Board-Certified surgeons more accurately treat patients' needs. Some of the procedures performed by HDOFS include:

- · Wisdom teeth removal
- Dental extractions
- Dental implants
- Bone grafting
- Oral pathology
- Facial cosmetic
- · Cleft & craniofacial
- Facial trauma
- Jaw surgery
- Temporomandibular Joint Dysfunction (TMJ) surgery
- Head & neck surgery

Physicians at HDOFS currently perform complex, life-changing surgeries at UMC, as well as El Paso Children's Hospital, on patients of any age, from newborn to elderly. Some of these procedures can only be found at HDOFS.

The dental clinic provides services to patients of all ages. Some treatment plans, for conditions such as cleft palate, may begin before birth, during pregnancy.

These procedures have restored hope and changed the lives of the center's patients from throughout the Borderland.

EPCMS also works with the Texas Medical Association to secure the enactment and enforcement of legislation that will provide the best practice of medicine.


When medical supplies became scarce during the pandemic, EPCMS was able to provide a weekly distribution of PPE to private practices, with the help of BorderRAC, a healthcare coalition in El Paso.

"The El Paso County Medical Society is a medical society of El Paso physicians designed or geared towards promoting healthcare in El Paso. We are a voice for quality healthcare and means for physicians to come together on projects," said Dr. Hendryx.

Dr. Hendryx became UMC's first Chief Medical Officer in 2017, after more than a decade.

He is widely recognized in El Paso as one of the foremost physician leaders who is able to blend healthcare industry experience, private practice, and largeorganization leadership.

FORMER UMC CEO REMEMBERED



Dete J. Duarte (June 9, 1938 - February 4, 2023) Twenty years after being at the helm of R.E. Thomason Hospital, University Medical Center of El Paso's former name, Pete J. Duarte is still fondly remembered for his leadership and compassion towards patients.

Duarte worked at R.E. Thomason Hospital for 14 years until 2003. He served 11 of those years as CEO, or "Chief Servant," as he preferred to be called.

He once said, "My role models and heroes were all Servants – Martin Luther King, Gandhi, Mother Teresa, Nelson Mandela, our first Chicana County Judge for El Paso County [Alicia Chacon], my parents and Cesar Chavez. All of them were visionary and they all acted on hope, a value that guides all of us as we seek a better understanding of the forces that shape and determine our lives."

Duarte became a healthcare community organizer for the "war on poverty." He was a staunch advocate for the people and communities that University Medical Center of El Paso endeavors to serve today.

During his time as Chief Servant, he instituted a policy of R&D or "Respect and Dignity" at the hospital, making sure all patients and employees would be treated fairly and compassionately.

The values Duarte instituted continue to be echoed through our hospital's CARES values.

During Duarte's 14-year tenure, R.E. Thomason was twice named among America's Top 100 Hospitals, an accomplishment that has not been duplicated by any other hospital in our region.

UMC Associates Remember Pete Duarte:

"He was a great leader. We would walk down the hallway and see him and he knew our names. He would always ask me how I was and how my family was. He was such a sweet man. While conversing one day, he was very interested in knowing why I became a Respiratory Therapist. He was genuinely interested in what I had to say."


A MICROSCOPIC VIEW

UMC's Lab Gets Technology Upgrades To Increase Sample Testing, Speed Up Results

Behind University Medical Center of El Paso's main campus, inside the region's largest laboratory, over 150 Associates work around the clock to provide a vital service for patients across El Paso.

Chemists, lab techs, scientists, biologists, and others at the UMC laboratory collect and test samples for the hospital and its clinics, as well as El Paso Children's Hospital, and many other healthcare organizations throughout the region.

"We help the doctors assess what's going on with the patient on the inside. Once [doctors] get the lab work, they'll know, does this person need blood? Do they need iron or maybe some electrolytes to balance them out? Without the lab

work we do here, it would be difficult for them to diagnose a patient appropriately," said Elisa Camacho, Manager of UMC Lab Operations.

As the number of patients grows, so does the need to expand. In February, the lab began streamlining the work of

several instruments, under one major system, by transitioning to a new lab automation technology called Roche 8100, powered by Infinity.

This automation will allow chemists, lab techs, scientists, biologists, and others at the UMC laboratory to increase the volume of samples tested and provide more immediate results.

The entire transition to Roche 8100 is expected to be complete by Dec. 31.

"This automation that you guys see, this is a lot of the stuff a lot of the patients don't see. A lot of the people you see around me serve a major, major role in improving patient care and a lot of

them never touch the patient, they never see the patient," said David Herrera, Services Manager at the lab.

Once operational, a new Hemotology system will also be installed onto the Roche 8100 in March 2024.

Meantime, construction for new chemistry analyzers, Roche Cobas PROS, is expected to be installed by early April. Validation, IT implementation, and testing will take approximately three months before the Roche Cobras PROS goes live in late July.

JACLYN'S RETURN TO UMC

Former traumatic brain injury patient reconnects with nurses, staff

A common sentiment amongst doctors and nurses in the emergency room is that they, more often than not, see people at their worst and seldom, if ever, get to see that same patient at their best.

However, there are some cases in which a patient and the people who once cared for them, reunite.

Such a reunion came to fruition on Jan. 31, five years after Jaclyn Pellicotte's traumatic brain injury on Oct. 30, 2018.

Jaclyn was a passenger in a vehicle that was hit head-on by the driver of a Ford F-150 truck.

"A nightmare, I would have to say; for a parent, it's your worst nightmare," said Jaclyn's mother, Sheri Pellicotte.

The medical staff at UMC were able to stabilize Jaclyn and perform a double craniotomy, an operation where the bone flaps on both sides of her skull were removed to reduce severe swelling in her brain.

She was not expected to make it through her first night at UMC, but 16 surgeries later, she was able to walk the halls of UMC and share her story of recovery during UMC's "Lunch & Learn" January session.

Jaclyn spent two months at UMC, treated by nurses like Sarah Herrera, who at the time of Jaclyn's injury, worked as the emergency room manager.

Five years later, Herrera still remembers treating Jaclyn.

"She was so young and she was in terrible shape. She had very bad injuries," said Herrera.

Nancy McGrail was the director of the ER at the time. Tears instantly fell from her face as she hugged Jaclyn for the first time.

"This makes us realize what we do matters," said McGrail.

Jaclyn's mother recalled a sign hanging in the halls of the intensive care unit at UMC which reads, "Faith will see us through" and told UMC staff it gave her hope during her daughter's toughest days.

"When you are rushing down the hall, you may not see it, but it is there," said Sheri.

She added, "Thank you for studying, and putting in the hard work. We have UMC on our side and we tell people that all the time."

Your staff was EXCELLENT. All the way



BREAKING BARRIERS THROUGH THE POWER OF LANGUAGE

The important role qualified medical interpreters play in healthcare

Living in a border region presents unique situations for physicians and medical staff who often come across patients with limited English proficiency.

It's often assumed most everyone in El Paso is bilingual, but that assumption could jeopardize a patient's diagnosis, if symptoms are misinterpreted.

University Medical Center of El Paso (UMC) is able to overcome these types of communication barriers with the use of qualified medical interpreters (QMI).

UMC has two full-time QMIs, Rubén Lucero and Carlos Ramos, and an additional 170 volunteer QMIs in different units to assist Associates with medical interpreting (which is verbal) and translation (which is written).

Lucero and Ramos believe it's important for QMIs to immerse themselves in the cultures of the communities they serve, to provide clarity in instances where culture could create a divide between patient and provider, even if both speak the same language.

Ramos explained there is no direct translation for terms commonly used in Mexico, such as "empacho" or "susto," which are used to describe an upset stomach or a scare.

"This is when an interpreter needs to utilize their knowledge of that

particular culture to describe what the patient is trying to communicate to a doctor." said Ramos.

Certain laws, such as Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Executive Order 13166, and Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act, make medical interpreting a requirement by law.

If a patient's preferred language is Spanish, they can request a QMI, free of charge at UMC.

A patient whose preferred language is other than Spanish, to include American Sign Language, can also ask for a QMI, which will be provided through a telephone and video system called Language Line Solutions.

PREVENTING ATV INJURIES

UMC's Level 1 Trauma Center Division of Injury Prevention knows how dangerous ATV-related injuries can be and because of that, has implemented an ATV Proper Riding Objective (PRO) program.

The ATV PRO program is in its third year thanks to a grant awarded from the Yamaha Outdoor Access Initiative in early 2022 for \$15,211.

The program, led by UMC's Trauma Grants Program Manager, Xochitl Gamboa, has provided free Department of Transportation (DOT) certified ATV helmets and safety gear to 17 course graduates ranging in age from 10 to 18.

In years past, UMC's ATV PRO program provided group youth courses for students who did not own youth-sized ATVs, however this year, UMC produced an English and Spanish public service announcement (PSA) to reach more riders.

"My goal is to reach the kids who are already riding," said Gamboa. "It takes more than just a helmet to ride an ATV safely."

The work by UMC's ATV PRO program is coordinated by a partnership consisting of injury prevention experts and off-highway vehicle experts, as well as local Yamaha retailer, Viva Power Sports.




