

What is this all about?

The El Paso County Hospital District recently went before the El Paso County Commissioners Court to consider the posting of the District's intent to seek a certificate of obligation bond for \$345.7 million to strengthen the capacity of University Medical Center (UMC) and El Paso Children's Hospital (EPCH). The El Paso County Commissioners Court is scheduled to meet on Sept. 12 to vote on the passage of this request.

What is the need?

University Medical Center and El Paso Children's Hospital both need more beds. For example, UMC often has more critical care patients than available beds. In addition, El Paso Children's successfully reduced the number of children leaving El Paso for necessary care.

UMC and EPCH offer a number of very specialized, unique services in our community that have resulted in an increase in patients who choose to come to these hospitals to address complex health conditions.

A few examples of this type of care include:

- · Only Level 1 Trauma Center
- · Only Level 1 Comprehensive Stroke Center certified by the Joint Commission
- · Level IV Maternal Care (highest level)
- · Level IV NICU (highest level)
- · Children's Oncology Group

UMC is El Paso's only safety net hospital, meaning that the hospital provides care to all who come to it.

Why now?

While the needs existed before now, the increase in patients and services make capacity needs more urgent at this time.

With the current environment of rapid interest rate increases and rising costs, waiting to address these needs will likely cost taxpayers tens of millions of dollars more. Plus, for the past two years, both hospitals were handling the County's efforts in fighting the COVID-19 pandemic and administering vaccines. It's important to remember that the District has not requested similar funds in nearly a decade.

What will the money be used for?

There are five distinct capacity needs that the District is hoping to remedy via a Certificate of Obligation.

They are:

- 1. Expansion of Critical Care Beds.
- 2. Surgery Capacity Care Expansion. UMC needs additional operating rooms and labs necessary for heart and brain care. A special operating room will enable UMC and EPCH to

provide care for burn patients who now must leave El Paso and their families for necessary care.

- 3. A Neighborhood Health and Urgent Care Center in Central El Paso to care for older adults in an area that lacks access to care.
- 4. Expansion of pediatric beds, operating rooms, and emergency department beds at El Paso Children's Hospital.
- 5. A Comprehensive Cancer Center. El Paso is one of the largest metropolitan areas in the U.S. that does not have a comprehensive

cancer center within a two-hour drive. UMC. EPCH. and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso, are best positioned to lead a comprehensive cancer center for El Paso.

As a taxpaver, what will this cost me?

If the Certificate of Obligation is issued in October of 2022, then you would pay the following for every \$100,000 of your property valuation:

2023 to 2032 - \$56.80 per year or \$4.73 monthly, and then reduced to: 2033 to 2047 - \$28.70 per year or \$2.39 monthly.

Will this produce more jobs for El Paso?

Yes. It is estimated that this will create 400 high paying jobs at UMC and El Paso Children's Hospital,

infusing \$31 million into our local economy every year.

In addition, these capacity initiatives will create approximately 850 construction jobs, not including the feeder businesses benefiting from this construction. These building projects will infuse approximately \$38.5 million into our local economy.

UMC AT THE FOREFRONT

Dr. Adam Adler and UMC Revolutionize Hip Replacement With El Paso's First Minimally Invasive Surgery



Dr. Adam Adler, Department of Orthopedic Surgery, Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, Asst. Professor of Trauma and Hip Reconstruction at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center (TTUHSC), recently performed El Paso's first minimally invasive sacroiliac joint reduction and fusion with the iFuse TORQ implant system. This is another UMC first. In doing so, Dr. Adler ushered-in an evolution toward total hip replacement as the standard of care for hip fractures.

The Journal Orthopedic Trauma estimates there are between 260,000 and 300,000 admissions for hip fractures in the US, with projections of more than 500,000 per year by 2040.

"There is a lot of literature on hips that fixing the hip fracture within 24 hours contributes to a better outcome for patients," said Dr. Adler. "These patients are generally older, 65 to 90, even 100 years old, and so they lay in bed because they can't move, and that becomes a problem because being in bed is never good for anyone, particularly an elderly patient, because they become immobile and they have lung problems, cardiac problems and could die."

Dr. Adler, an orthopedic traumatologist, said this is where the iFuse-TORQ comes into play.

"What we are starting to find now is the same problem with hip fractures as we are seeing in the pelvis. These patients who are elderly fall and they have a pelvic re-injury," said Dr. Adler, "and it's the same problem where they don't get up and walk. The difference is that these fractures will heal as the hip fracture generally will not heal on its own because of the healing characteristics. However, if we could do a surgery to take away the pain by putting a fixation across the fracture then they may be able to mobilize quicker, get out of bed earlier and not have the same problems with hip fractures that are not treated in a timely fashion."

"UMC is the only hospital in El Paso that is a Level 1 Trauma Center and that has the capability of having a full-time orthopedic traumatologist," said Dr. Adler. Dr. Adler's new paradigm is to offer patients who were previously ambulatory, but are no longer able to walk, surgical intervention within 24-hours if the cause is determined to be a fracture as the first surgery he performed. This provides an opportunity to impact the very high mortality rate these patients currently experience by making them mobile again.

Patient Chooses UMC For Successful Cutting Edge Surgery For Rare Cancer



Andi and Tom Meece will recognize their 50th wedding anniversary in August. They plan to celebrate in a couple of years once Andi is fully recovered.

Until recently, Andi (Andrea) Meece has never spent much time in a hospital, except for the births of her two children. Last summer, while driving from Austin back to El Paso, she felt an unusual growth above her mouth. Her dentist thought it was a root absorption and sent her to a periodontist who sent her to an oral surgeon, and by early January. Andi was sent for a biopsy.

"I knew I was in trouble when I walked into the oral surgeon's office for the results of the biopsy and he asked if my husband was there?" said Andi, who has lived in El Paso for 47 years with her husband. Tom Meece.

The biopsy showed a rare form of upper jaw cancer called Sclerosing Odontogenic Carcinoma. Andi and Tom decided to have her surgery at UMC with

Dr. Hans Brockhoff II. DDS. MD. FACS, one of the region's top Head & Neck and Microvascular Reconstructive Surgeons.

"It was our choice to go to UMC." said Andi. The surgery took 11 to 12 hours on March 11: ironically, also on Tom's birthday. Dr. Brockhoff told Tom he had given him a cancer-free wife as a birthday gift. He declared the surgery a huge success.

"Dr. Brockhoff is credentialed as long as my arm," said Tom, "Hat's off to him because so many of our doctors and doctor friends said, that five or six years ago, we would have had to go out of town."

Dr. Brockhoff said he loves living and working in El Paso.



UMC Foundation of El Paso announces a \$45.000 commitment by KLS Martin to assist with the establishment of the El Paso Head & Neck and Microvascular Reconstructive Surgery Fellowship. With the support of UMC leadership and the medical directorship of Hans Brockhoff II. DDS. MD. FACS. Fellowship Director, the fellowship will be one of only 13 in the entire United States for Oral and Maxillofacial surgery.

"Our goal is to train the next generation

of head and neck surgeons, right here in El Paso," said Dr. Brockhoff, "Prior to the formation of our team, many people with these surgical requirements had to leave El Paso and seek care in another part of the country."

of care not available elsewhere in the region, and because of his commitment and dedication, many patients no longer need to seek medical treatment outside of our region when faced with cancer of the head and neck," said R. Jacob Cintron, President & CEO of the El Paso County Hospital District.

stressors and manage them with self-compassion so that life once again becomes a joyful experience. Did you know if you spend just two minutes in the morning practicing mindfulness, simply focusing on, say, your breathing," said Dr. Sofia (as she likes to be called), "that you will begin to stay more in the present moment? This practice teaches us to self-regulate and experience gratitude, hence creating a relaxed state of being during your workday and personal life. It is so possible!"

UMC's Rehab Outpatient Team Cheers On Teen Patient Who Won't Quit

Sixteen-year old Bryan Iverson wanted to spend some time with his mother, Martha. They decided to go to the gym together, where Bryan

began lifting weiahts. Moments later, he began vomitina and losina consciousness. Bryan had a cerebral bleed and brainstem compression. He was transferred to El Paso Children's Hospital, where Bryan underwent two surgeries and was placed in a medically induced coma for a month.


Bryan later spent three months at Nexus Children's Hospital in Houston for rehabilitation therapies and once home, went to UMC's

Rehabilitation Outpatient Department at the main campus.

"He came into the clinic pretty much crawling," said Marcela Gomez, Occupational Therapist at UMC Rehab Outpatient and Bryan's primary therapist. "He came in with a walker and he had to feel for things because he had some vision deficits. The doctors told him he was never going to walk again without an assistive device and his

Bryan required the help of speech therapy. Here, he met Cecilia Amaya, Speech Language Pathologist, UMC Rehab Outpatient. "He complained of having trouble swallowing: he couldn't pronounce certain sounds, and had memory difficulties," said Cecilia. "We


worked on his speech, tone, and his flow. We worked twice a week for a year. He has made a lot of progress," said Cecilia, "His motivation causes him to ask, 'What can I do to improve?'"

Bryan is thankful for UMC.

"UMC helps me emotionally and emotional health is better," said Bryan, who graduated in May from his high school in the top 10 percent of his class. "They are like family to me. Marcela has inspired me to be an occupational therapist. The therapists help physically and emotionally because feeling good and being happy means so much to me."

Bryan's mother, Martha, simply sees her son as remarkable.

"He was in a wheelchair when he started therapy," said Martha who is a single mother with a grown son and daughter, who she credits being there for Bryan. "He came in with a cane, a walker and now he is walking. I have been very happy with the therapies from UMC. They have been helping him a lot. I am very happy. He is a miracle."






