### POISON CENTER BRINGS HIGHEST LEVEL OF SERVICE

America's first 24-hour bilingual regional poison center - now 100% certified!

A question not many people think about until they are faced with a scenario that warrants it is what to do in case of a possible poisoning. Sometimes, cleaning supplies are mixed and create toxic fumes that can start to make you feel lightheaded -- or you may accidentally take a double dose of medication and start experiencing side effects.

In situations like these, it is reassuring to know everyone is certified at UMC's West Texas Regional Poison Center.

In addition to being America's first 24-hour bilingual regional poison center, the West Texas Regional

Poison Center is now 100-percent certified by the American Association of Poison Control Centers.

This team, which provides services to 36 counties in Texas, has worked extremely hard to pass their certification exams.

"I'm very proud," said Salvador Baeza, Director of the West Texas Regional Poison Center at University Medical Center of El Paso. "The team had to study in addition to working and it's a lot of prep work."

Baeza said the certification process is not easy, but regardless, the team was able to pass the exam on the first try.

Juana Roman, Spec. Poison Information RN, is among the group of poison control specialists who passed their certification exam.

She believes being part of a team who is 100-percent certified by the American Association of Poison Control Centers is a huge advantage to the community, especially during a potentially lifethreatening situation.

"This means when you are talking to somebody at our poison center, you know you are talking to someone who put a lot of effort into knowing how to help you and properly advise you. That makes all the difference," said Roman.

### **UMC SECURES ANOTHER FIRST**

New AI colonoscopy screening technology comes to Digestive Health Center

University Medical Center of El Paso's Digestive Health Center has implemented the use of the region's first artificial intelligence (AI) endoscopy module, called the GI Genius<sup>TM</sup>.

This computer-aided polyp detection system is powered by Al to find colorectal polyps during a colonoscopy screening.

Having this technology available to UMC's patients is a huge step in identifying suspicious lesions, which could be an indicator of colorectal cancer.

"This technology integrated in our system can recognize and spot polyps. The patient gets a high-quality colonoscopy and we can see the entire colon," said Dr. Sherif Elhanafi, Professor of Medicine, Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, Interventional Endoscopy Gastroenterologist at UMC.

The GI Genius<sup>™</sup> will serve as a "second observer" during colonoscopies, improving the adenoma detection rate (ADR), which is the number of times a physician detects a precancerous polyp during a colonoscopy screening, and identifying missed lesions.

"We have an already excellent detection rate for finding

colon polyps here; however, we utilize this latest technology to make it better. So, in addition to us looking for polyps, the machine is looking for polyps. It puts a green box around the polyp and we decide if it is a polyp or not," explained Dr. Marc Zuckerman, Professor of Medicine, Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, Chief, Division of Gastroenterology at UMC.

Approximately 4.1 percent of men and women in the U.S. will be diagnosed with colorectal cancer at some point during their lifetime, based on data from the National Cancer Institute.

The GI Genius<sup>™</sup> module is the first and only AI system for detection of colon polyps in the United States and UMC is proud to offer it to our patients here in El Paso.

## CARE IS A FAMILY AFFAIR FOR FATHER & SON PHYSICIANS AT UMC

On any given day, you are bound to find at least one Abedin at UMC's Heart Rhythm Clinic.

Both Dr. Zainul Abedin and his son, Moeen Abedin, bring more than 60 years of combined experience to the Cardiac Cath Lab, often times working on procedures, such as lead extractions, together.

However, this was not something either envisioned would ever happen. Growing up, Dr. Moeen did not think he would be following his father's footsteps as an electrophysiologist.

"When I left high school, the plan was to become a scientist in biology or genetics, so I didn't think I was going to come back here and work with him," said Dr. Moeen.

He explained how his father's love for electrophysiology was what sparked his interest in the field. He grew up watching his father become the first Board-Certified electrophysiologist in El Paso.

"The specialty only came into its own being in 1992. He was in the first group. He trained on his own by visiting other labs. He learned everything teaching himself and visiting other electrophysiologists. He sees how things have changed since then and I can tell he's happy I'm here," said Dr. Moeen.

Although passionate about electrophysiology, Dr. Zainul said he never pushed his son to pursue the same career as him.

"That was his decision to follow this path of electrophysiology," said Dr. Zainul. "We didn't talk about the work at home, but from time to time I would take the children to the hospital and make rounds to see patients."

Nonetheless, Dr. Zainul said seeing

what his son does on a daily basis, makes him extremely proud.

"I think he's accomplished a lot. This is a very specialized field of cardiology. He's been trained by some of the world-renowned physicians in Oklahoma and Utah and he's been to prestigious institutions, such as Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, Maryland for residency and the University of Texas Southwestern in Dallas. Who would not be proud of that accomplishment?" said Dr. Zainul.

The youngest Abedin is also looking to pursue electrophysiology and expected to start his fellowship training in July in Utah, where his older brother, Dr. Moeen, also completed his training.

The Abedins said they try to avoid talking about work when they are at home with family, but sometimes can't help discussing new technology to better the care they provide to patients.

# AN EL PASO FIRST, ADVANCED SURGICAL ROBOT AT UMC



The Da Vinci SP (Single Port) robotic arm, by Intuitive, helps make surgeries less invasive and less painful.

University Medical Center of El Paso is the only hospital in El Paso to implement the use of a high-performance singleport robotic surgical system called Da Vinci SP by Intuitive.

UMC is proud to continue leading the way in advanced medical technology for El Paso by introducing this new technology that gives surgeons the ability to deliver robotic-assisted surgery through a single port, instead of multiple ports.

The Da Vinci SP system provides 360-degrees of anatomical access through three wristed instruments

on a single port. This updated model helps surgeons perform complex procedures and allows them the flexibility to control the robot from a position other than bedside.

The use of the Da Vinci SP makes surgeries less invasive and allows patients to leave the hospital quicker. It can also offer paitents less pain and less long-term difficulties.

Dr. Ben Westbrook, one of many surgeons at UMC who utilize the Da Vinci Surgical Robot, explained how the robot represents dramatic advances in robotic surgical capabilities.

"Robotic surgery has developed a strong foothold in the surgical realm and is here to stay," said Dr. Westbrook. "It is an exciting technology that has a fairly narrow application currently, but surely over time, that will broaden and allow us to help more and more patients."

Currently, the Da Vinci SP robot is being used at UMC to remove throat cancer, and for surgeries to alter the anatomy of the back of the throat to treat sleep apnea, but in the future, it can be used for a variety of narrow access surgeries.

### **HOW STRONG? LAYLA STRONG!**

### Patient returns to UMC to thank trauma and ICU teams

"Soup" was Layla Sanchez's first word after months of recovering from a crash that caused severe damage to her brain and several other organs in her body. It was a huge milestone from when she first arrived at UMC in critical condition.

Layla, who was 15-years-old at the time, was on her way home from basketball practice with her sister when they were T-boned by the driver of a speeding car in January.

"The car flipped about four or five times," said Layla's father, Jessie Sanchez. "When they came in, Layla needed immediate lifesaving surgery and then during her time here, she went through about four surgeries."

Once stabilized, Layla was sent to Craig Hospital in Denver for rehabilitation therapy where she began learning how to do everything she was able to do before.

"She is no longer on long-term medications and is expected to make a full recovery, thanks to the life-saving measures that were executed here at UMC to save her life," her father said. After returning from Denver, Layla visited the nurses and doctors who cared for her during her time at UMC and surprised them with pens that said "How Strong? Layla Strong!" during one of their meetings.

Several nurses who cared for Layla, to include Valerie Salazar, RN Neuro ICU, cried as they saw her stand from her wheelchair.

"I took care of Layla the first three days she was here and she was very sick," said Salazar. "It was very exciting because we all saw her when she left and to see her now be able to stand is amazing. It's a true miracle."

Sanchez believes his daughter's recovery was thanks in large part to the care she received at UMC. "This is a wonderful place," said Sanchez. "I am so lucky she was sent here and that she had the amazing team she had here because it would not have been possible without everyone here."

Layla is now ready to continue therapy at home and be evaluated to return to school.

### TRAILBLAZING A PROCEDURE FOR BETTER DIGESTIVE HEALTH

Two Texas Tech Physicians at UMC pioneer new treatment.

For years, Dr. Richard McCallum and Dr. Irene Sarosiek have pioneered the treatment of a condition called gastroparesis, in which the stomach becomes paralyzed and cannot empty food.

When food begins to accumulate in the stomach, it pushes on the stomach walls, signaling the brain to find a way to get rid of the food, and triggering nausea or vomiting.

"We would give medications for it, but for about 30 to 40-percent of our patients, that was not enough," said Dr. McCallum. Professor of Medicine, Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso, Division of Gastroenterology and Director of Gastrointestinal Motility at UMC.

The procedure called Gastric Electrical Stimulation (GES) is able to block nausea and vomiting by surgically implanting a device onto the stomach muscles. The device then sends low-energy impulses, stimulating the stomach to empty food and alleviate symptoms.

"Because electrical this stimulator, patients are able to return to some sort of normal Most lifestyle. importantly, we can control diabetes," said Dr. McCallum.

Nancy Griego is one of those patients whose life was changed by the procedure. "I had a lot of stomach problems. I was bloated all the time, I had nausea and vomiting and I was in dire need of somebody to look at me. It changed my life a lot. Now, I go out more and I'm more comfortable going out. I'm glad UMC is here and that I was asked to be part of this [trial]," said Griego.

Dr. Sarosiek, Professor of Internal Medicine at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center El Paso, said the research was part of the NIH Research Consortium for patients who have gastroparesis.

She explained there have been approximately 150 of these surgeries performed in El Paso by Dr. Brian Davis. "We have patients from other states and Dr. McCallum has even seen patients from Israel and Australia who came to El Paso to look for some hope and treatment," said Dr. Sarosiek.

She and Dr. McCallum believe this FDA-approved procedure is the last step in saving the lives of many patients who have had multiple admissions to the hospital and exhausted all medications on the market for their illness.

### IN MEMORIAM OF DR. JIMENEZ



In Loving Memory of Dr. David F. Jimenez Our borderland has lost one of its greatest champions of pediatric care with the sudden passing of Dr. David F. Jimenez. He brought innovation and an advanced level of expertise that has changed the lives and futures of many children. Before he arrived in our city, El Paso families had to travel hundreds of miles to get their child the advanced level of care that, in many cases, was required to live.

Dr. Jimenez completed medical school and residency at Temple University in Philadelphia, PA, and his pediatric neurosurgery fellowship at Albert Einstein School of Medicine in New York City. He specialized in all aspects of pediatric neurosurgery with a focus on minimally invasive approaches. He was Board Certified in pediatric and adult neurosurgery. Dr. Jimenez pioneered endoscopic surgery to treat craniosynostosis in his pediatric neurosurgery work.

Internationally recognized for developing the Endoscopic-Assisted Craniotomy more than two decades ago, Dr. Jimenez, was honored by America's Top Doctors, Best Doctors in America, among many others. The list of medical honors and awards is extensive, reflecting his lifetime work as a thought leader, sought-after lecturer, well-funded researcher, and prolific writer. He has been caring for families locally and from around the world for more than 30 years.

Dr. Jimenez will forever be missed by the patients he served and everyone who knew him at UMC, EPCH, our Foundations and all who knew him or witnessed his kindness and brilliance as a surgeon.

# UMC'S MOBILE STROKE UNIT HELPS SAVE PATIENT'S LIFE



UMC's Mobile Stroke Unit, the only Mobile Stroke Unit in the region, arrives at UMC's main campus emergency room.

In early May, Rafael Rivera was rushed to University Medical Center in the Mobile Stroke Unit with signs of a stroke.

"The first nurse who cared for him here spent three hours talking to my brother, making him feel comfortable. She kept him calm and that was awesome. He's gotten great care here," said Rivera's brother. Fernando.

Rivera's brother said Ruth Vasquez, Cardiac Tech II, took the initiative to explain everything that was going on. She kept his brother calm through the beginning of the procedure until he was placed under general anesthesia.

Although Rivera was confused about what was happening to him at the time of the stroke, he said he had seen the signs of a stroke well before it happened.

"I had recently seen a specialist who told me my veins were not looking

good. I had been very anxious about that." Rivera said.

Rivera thought back to the ride to UMC in the Mobile Stroke Unit. It was there he was told he was experiencing symptoms of a stroke.

He remembered losing the ability to move his hand and the desperation he felt of not being able to lift his arm and grab onto the paramedic who was helping him. "I felt secure here at UMC. This is actually my second stroke. The first one was a couple of years ago in Albuquerque and it was a fiasco, but this one, UMC had it all under control. They were on it. They recognized the signs and started running tests immediately."

At UMC, patients like Rivera can feel at ease knowing they are being treated at our region's only Level 1 Stroke Center and Joint Commission-certified Comprehensive Stroke Center.

UMC is also home to the region's only Mobile Stroke Unit, an ambulance containing specialized equipment, staff, and medications specifically tailored to the diagnosis and treatment of a stroke.

Rivera shared his story in hopes of spreading awareness to others, especially since May was National Stroke Awareness Month, and to thank Ruth Vasquez and the team at UMC for the care he received.


