THE FIRST PORTABLE MRI IN WEST TEXAS REGION

UMC is once again at the forefront with a new MRI scanner, The Swoop.

At the end of 2022, University Medical Center of El Paso announced another advancement in healthcare as the region's first portable MRI (magnetic resonance imaging) system goes into operation. The system, known as the Swoop, is revolutionizing MRI scanning by bringing the MRI system to patients, at bedside.

"This is another advanced tool our providers have to have scans done for patients who are too sick or unable to be transported downstairs for imaging," said Greg Erickson, Assistant Administrator Ancillary Services. "This is a system that brings healthcare in El Paso another step forward, in line with what we are seeing in some of the top healthcare systems in the

nation. For the last month, we have been training 25 UMC Associates to operate the system and now, it's ready for patients."

Initially, the Swoop system will be used for follow-up scans on patients with brain injuries or otherwise being treated for brain issues in UMC's Neuro ICU Department. "Not only does this bring added conveniences, but it also expedites our ability to provide MRI's when medically necessary. This brings the system to the patient, in minutes," added Erickson. The Swoop system is small enough to fit in elevators and through doorways, making it very maneuverable in large, busy hospital environments, such as UMC.



UMC SURGEONS PUBLISH ORAL/MAXILLOFACIAL STUDY

Finding A Better Route For Oral and Maxillofacial Reconstructive Surgery

Two of UMC's Oral and Maxillofacial surgeons have proved a better way to treat patients undergoing reconstructive surgery. Dr. Arshad Kaleem, Associate Fellowship Director for UMC's El Paso Head and Microvascular Reconstructive Surgery Fellowship, along with Dr. Enrique Schubert, Fellow, collaborated with colleagues to publish a study comparing skin grafts and local flaps used to cover the site where skin and bone are harvested in a patient for reconstructive surgery. According to the study, flaps are more successful than skin grafts.

"The reconstruction of facial defects with tissue borrowed from other parts of the body is called a free flap or free tissue transfer," said Dr. Kaleem. "In the fibula free flap procedure, bone and skin, along with blood vessels

are taken from the leg and moved to the facial region to reconstruct the facial skeleton. This procedure leaves a skin defect at the donor site in the leg. Many techniques used to cover the donor site has one option, taking a skin graft from the thigh to help cover the skin defect, but this basically creates another wound in the body to help cover the leg wound."

Dr. Kaleem and his colleagues proposed, instead, the propeller flap technique for covering the skin defect at the leg without the need for a skin graft. Findings from Dr. Kaleem's study with a sample of 50 patients in two groups, published in the September issue of the "Head & Neck" Scholarly Journal, titled: "Comparison of Propeller Flaps Versus Skin Grafts for Coverage of Osteocutaneous Fibula Free Flap Donor Site Defects," show many benefits of using the propeller flap technique over a skin graft.

SYMPOSIUM PREPARES UMC AS FIRST MAGNET HOSPITAL

Nursing research symposium to help UMC become El Paso's first magnet hospital.

In its first UMC Nursing Research Symposium titled "Academic Excellence at UMC/Nurses," UMC's Registered Nurses gathered on Oct. 14 at El Paso Health to learn how vital nursing research is for our hospital in order for it to become El Paso's first Magnet Designated hospital. UMC Nurses from campus and clinics absorbed the presenters' messages; listened to the panellists describe their projects in a poster review and asked many questions about how they can pursue research to help UMC in its mission.

"I want you all to know today is all about you learning not just that research is important for our profession, but also seeing what our nurses here at UMC are doing," said Amyra Daher, Chief Nursing Officer. "You have experts at our facility and it is important that we all understand what we do; in research, we learn things that we didn't know existed before."

Magnet designated hospitals provide patients and their families with a benchmark by which to measure the quality of care they can expect to receive. The "Magnet" name helps patients identify hospitals where they can find satisfied nurses and expect to receive a higher level of care.

UMC SURGEON STRIVES TO CURE DIGESTIVE ISSUE

Dr. Vid Fikfak looks to address a sensitive condition that's often overlooked

Nearly 20 million Americans. primarily women and older adults, have difficulty controlling when it's time to go to the bathroom. It can be a difficult subject to discuss for many people but it primarily focuses on an inability to control bowel movements. Worse yet, in El Paso, only one percent of patients diagnosed with this condition are treated and the rest, according to Dr. Vid Fikfak, Colorectal Surgeon with UMC and Texas Tech Physicians of El Paso, live their lives in shame, embarrassment and isolation.

Now, with UMC's green light to use a device that causes electrical stimulation of the nerves that control this bodily function, 90 percent of patients can find their problem solved. The device is called Interstim Therapy, made by Medtronics.

Dr. Fikfak began to analyze the problem. He went to Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and to University Medical Center of El Paso to look for data associated with this condition.

"UMC showed tens of thousands of patients with the same condition. We had to establish a framework of how to funnel these patients through; it is a complex issue because people don't want to talk about it, even with physicians," said Dr. Fikfak. Dr. Fikfak came up with a questionnaire for fecal continence,

similar to a national standardized questionnaire, and staff began calling these patients. "It is a hard nut to crack because so much stigma is associated with it. People feel they have lived with it so long and they don't have jobs that give them time to see someone about the treatment, so they just live with it. It is a very complex dynamic."

Dr. Fiktak began to organize Lunch and Learns in the UMC Clinics around El Paso where patients are invited to attend to hear about the treatment. With this new treatment, Dr. Fikfak hopes to bring many people relief and confidence that they likely have missed for many years.



Jasmery Zamora's life was very similar to millions of single parents challenged with getting an education while ensuring she also provided for her son. She tried desperately to attend classes since she was 21 years old. The years drifted by. She worked long hours as a CNA (certified nurse assistant) at UMC, able to find time occasionally for a class here, a class there.

She said she knew for certain, though, that she was going to get her education, no matter how long it took. Jasmery was focused and intent on becoming a Respiratory Therapist. "I told my supervisor that I would have to eventually switch from full-time to part-time so that I could finally finish my education but I knew it would be difficult financially," said Jasmery.

Luckily for Jasmery, the UMC CARES PULL-OPP Program arrived. PULL-OPP stands for Pursuing Upward Learning Legacy Opportunity. This program, which began last year, helps qualified Associates finish their education while being paid full-time but working a part-


time schedule. This allows Associates to attend classes and study when they might otherwise be at work, and still receive their full salary.

"I applied during my second semester," she said. "Once I was approved, I was able to really focus on my studies. The program allowed me to realize my dream."

She did just that.

Today, Jasmery is the first UMC Associate to graduate through the CARES PULL-OPP Program and she is now a Respiratory Therapist, receiving an increased salary and enjoying a new career. "As a single mom, of course I appreciate the money that comes with my new job, but the greater satisfaction for me is finally having a degree that no one can ever take away."


